

- 2) Hail 1 inch in diameter or larger.

Severe Thunderstorm Warning

A Severe Thunderstorm Warning is issued when severe thunderstorms are occurring or imminent in the warning area.

Severe thunderstorms are defined as follows:

- 1) Winds of 58 mph or higher AND/OR
- 2) Hail 1 inch in diameter or larger.

Tornado Watch

A Tornado Watch is issued when severe thunderstorms and tornadoes are possible in and near the watch area. It does not mean that they will occur. It only means they are possible.

Severe thunderstorms are defined as follows:

- 1) Winds of 58 mph or higher AND/OR
- 2) Hail 1 inch in diameter or larger.

Tornado Warning

A Tornado Warning is issued when a tornado is imminent. When a tornado warning is issued, seek safe shelter immediately.

High Wind Watch

A High Wind Watch is issued when the following conditions are possible:

1) sustained winds of 40 mph or higher for one hour or more

OR

2) wind gusts of 58 mph or higher for any duration.

High Wind Warning

A High Wind Warning is issued when the following conditions are expected:

1) sustained winds of 40 mph or higher for one hour or more

OR

2) wind gusts of 58 mph or higher for any duration.



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Take it to the Box



Tossing or flushing old medications can pollute water and harm fish or wildlife. Otter Tail County residents have a safe, anonymous and free disposal option that minimizes risks to health and safety – Take it to the Box! Old or unused prescription and over-the-counter medications can be safely disposed of at a Take it to the Box drop box location.

These secure drop boxes are located at various law enforcement centers throughout the county. The boxes are accessible during regular business hours: 8 am - 4:30 pm, M-F, unless posted otherwise.

Raising a Gardener

Did you garden as a kid? Did mom make you help weed when you would rather have been doing anything else? Were you the kid that had to pick raspberries? Bunkey did and he usually ended up looking like he had lost a fight with a wildcat, scratched, mosquito-bitten and sunburnt. It is no wonder he hated gardening for years.

Now that you are grown, you want your kids to learn the rewards of gardening. To do this properly, you must make it fun. Start by getting the children the proper tools. Not those kids-sized stuff but real tools. To start with all he will need is a good trowel and a small hand rake.

Give your child a part of the garden that is all his. One thing kids love is a "hideout". Let him plant one. Draw a large circle in the soil and let him plant sunflowers about 2 feet apart. Between the sunny seeds, help him plant climbing beans. There is a variety with red flowers and purple beans that don't look like the dreaded "food" beans. Mulch heavily inside and out so there is little weeding to do. By mid-summer he will have a green tepee to play in. Even if you don't mulch your garden, mulch his, pulling weeds is no fun.

There are some fun vegetables to plant. Kids love bright colors so plant the Swiss chard with bright stems, purple cabbage or carrots. Yellow beets, - the leaves are really good slightly boiled. Milder tasting than their cousin's spinach. There are all sorts of unusual vegetables. He may even eat veggies from his own garden.

There are seed packets especially for kids to plant. They have fast growing and interesting plants for the kids to grow. Encourage them to pull and eat carrots and onions from your garden with just a swipe along a pants leg to get the dirt chunks off. If they like tomatoes, let him plant a cherry tomato in his garden. A baby pumpkin plant will reward your child when he can take a bag of them for his classmates from 'his" garden. Another fun thing to plant is an assortment of gourds. If you have lots of room, plant one of the odd pumpkins, pink or warty for Halloween. If he hates squash, plant Celebration. They are bright colored, kid-sized, and very sweet.

If you don't have a vegetable garden, grow flowers. If your idea of flower gardening is how many flats of annuals you need this year, or what color geraniums for the pots you plant every spring, break the rules and buy a few easy-to-grow seeds and the two of you plant them together. Try marigold, zinnias, especially the candy-striped ones, cleome, nasturtiums, and calendula are all easy to grow and readily re-seed themselves giving you a jump start on flower gardening next spring.

Teach a child to love gardening and he will have a tool he will use all his life. All you need to do is make it fun, not work. Eat what he grows, even if it makes you gag.

Grilling

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

-))) Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors
-))) The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
-))) Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
-))) Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- >>>> Never leave your grill unattended.
-))) Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
-))) If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
-))) Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
-))) There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

Counties added to spring burn restrictions as wildfire risk increases in northwestern Minnesota

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has further expanded the area subject to open burning restrictions as the wildfire season deepens and expands in northwestern Minnesota.

The DNR will not issue permits for open burning of brush or yard waste in these counties until restrictions are lifted.

"Warm and dry conditions elevate the risk of wildfires, and restricting open burning prevents a burn pile from escaping and becoming a wildfire during times of high risk," said Allissa Reynolds, DNR wildfire prevention supervisor. "These restrictions really do work – they've helped reduce wildfires by more than 30 percent over the past decade."

Reynolds encourages residents to use alternatives to burning to dispose of yard waste, such as composting, chipping, or taking brush to a collection site. For more information, visit the wildfire prevention page of the DNR website(mndnr.gov/Wildfire/Prevention).

People cause 90% of wildfires in Minnesota. If a debris fire rekindles or escapes, the person who set it is liable for any damage caused, as well as for wildfire suppression costs.

Fergus Falls Area Fishing Outlook

WONDERING WHAT THE FISH ARE DOING?

Area fisheries managers for the Minnesota DNR have prepared a summary outlook report based on their observations and experience.

Generally speaking, anglers should expect good walleye fishing on area lakes during the 2022 season as several strong natural year classes and supplemental stockings have established abundant walleye populations. Small, shallow lakes are usually popular for the opener because the water temperatures will be warmer and the fish more active. Some traditional favorites for the opener include Walker, Anna, South Ten Mile, Orwell and Fish lakes. Some larger, deeper lakes that presently have strong year classes of harvestable walleyes include Star, Dead, Pelican, Sybil, Eagle and the Pine Lakes. Anglers should be aware that there is an 18- to 26-inch protected slot size limit for walleye on Big and Little Pine lakes.

Northern pike should be feeding actively as they spawn earlier than walleyes. Most of the large lakes in the area consistently produce above-average sized pike. Some smaller lakes that anglers may want to check-out for nice northern pike include Marion, Wall, Anna, Johnson and Jolly Ann lakes. Anglers are reminded of the northern pike slot length limit. The bag limit is 10 with not more than two over 26 inches. All pike from 22 to 26 inches must be released. Anglers looking to take advantage of the 10-fish bag can look to lakes like Swan, Dead, East Battle, South Lida, Heilberger and Loon. These lakes have an abundance of small pike less than 22 inches in length.

Panfish opportunities may be a viable option if the walleye and northern pike are not cooperating. Many area lakes presently support abundant populations of sunfish and black crappie with good size structures. Several of these lakes include Big McDonald, Little Pelican, Adley, McDonald, Schwartz, Dead, Blanche and the Leaf lakes. Anglers targeting sunfish need to be aware of 19 lakes in the area with reduced daily bag limits. The intent of the reduced bag limits is to maintain or improve the size structures of sunfish in lakes that have historically produced quality populations. Lakes with a five-sunfish daily bag limit include West Silent, Franklin, Bass, Middle, Fish by Weetown, and Fish by Parkers Prairie. Lakes with a 10-sunfish daily bag limit include East Lost, West Lost, Crystal, Deer, Wall, Red River,

Prairie, Stuart, Star, Big Pine, South Lida, North Lida and Long by Vergas. The statewide possession limit for sunfish still applies for these lakes.

The largemouth and smallmouth bass angling seasons will also begin on the May 14 opener; however, it is catch and release only until May 28. Most area lakes consistently produce abundant largemouth bass populations. Anglers interested in smallmouth bass should look to Pickerel, South Ten Mile, North Lida and Lizzie lakes. Anglers interested in a float fishing trip should consider the Otter Tail River, as it has a renowned catch-and-release only smallmouth bass fishery.

For anglers wanting to try something unique in the area for the opener, Bass Lake in Maplewood State Park is an option for trout fishing. Bass Lake is stocked annually with rainbow trout. Anglers are reminded that a state park permit and a trout stamp are required to fish Bass Lake. The use of live minnows for bait is prohibited and the bag limit is five with not more than three over 16 inches in length.

The exhibit will be showcased at the Fergus Falls Public Library from August 18-October 10, 2022. There are spaces for people to talk with their neighbors, add their own stories and water actions, and learn from video and audio stories. There are also puzzles, puppets, and kids' books so the littlest learners can participate too!

We invite students of all ages, members of social organizations and business partners to participate in the exhibit. Our goal in hosting the event for people in Otter Tail County to have an opportunity to share the important relationships they have with water, create an awareness about local water issues and increase education about water in Minnesota and particularly in Otter Tail County.







WATER & DRINKING WATER: Off in the campground for the season until May 13, 2022. Water is available yearround at the park office.

BATHROOM FACILITIES: Trail center restrooms are open year-round! Modern restroom facilities in the campground are closed for season until May 13, 2022. Vault toilets in the park are open year-round. Facilities are wheelchair accessible.

SHOWERS: Closed for season until May 13, 2022. Showers are wheelchair accessible.

DUMP STATION: None.

CAMPGROUNDS: Cart-in campground is open year-round. Camper Cabins and Yurts are open year-round, but just weekends between November 1 and March 31. The group camp is closed until May 13, 2022. Canoe sites are closed for season until April 29, 2022.

ELECTRIC SITES: One RV electric site is available after October 4 by calling the park. All camper cabins have electricity. *Special Notes for RV Campers: There is no RV camping in park in summer.*

TRAIL NOTES: The park has 11 miles of hiking trail, 5.2 miles of surfaced bike trail and 3.2 miles of mountain bike trails. In winter, park maintains 8 miles of groomed, easy to intermediate level cross-country ski trails, Snowshoeing is allowed alongside but not on groomed ski trails.

SEASON RENTALS: Bicycle, rowboat, canoe, kayak, paddleboat, and stand up paddleboard rental is open until October 25, 2021. Winter rentals (crosscountry skis and snowshoes) are not available. Nestled in the transition zone between prairie and hardwood forest, Glendalough offers a true respite from civilization. Crystal clear Annie Battle Lake is a 335-acre, non-motorized "Heritage Fishery" that provides a tranquil fishing experience second to none. Special regulations sustain a steady supply of large sunfish, crappie, and the occasional walleye for the frying pan, and large bass for the camera. Near the pristine shores of this lake are a cart-in campground and canoe-in campsites, all free from the traffic and noise of traditional drive-in camping.

Annie can also be the starting point for an exploration of the park by canoe or kayak on the connecting creeks. The restored historic Glendalough lodge on the north side of the lake details the park's history as a private retreat and game farm for the Minneapolis Tribune.

A paved bike trail loop and numerous hiking trails, including two interpretive trails, meander along five lakes, through rich woods and blooming prairies. Wildlife abounds year-round, and there are many observation decks along the trails. Trails are groomed in winter for skiing and snowshoeing. Picnicking and swimming is available on two sandy lakes.

NATURALIST PROGRAMS & PARK TOURS: Park shares a naturalist with Lake Carlos State Park. Call park office for more information.

BUILDINGS & ATTRACTIONS: Molly outdoor Picnic Shelter, historic Lodge, and Dining Hall are now available to rent and can be reserved by calling the park.

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Before you go

- Let someone know where you are going, the route you are taking, and when you expect to return.
- Plan an alternative take-out point in case of emergency.
- Monitor the weather. Check the forecast before leaving, and prepare for rain even if you don't think it will. Bring a weather radio as an early warning system for inclement weather.
- Dress appropriately for the weather. Wear guick-drying clothing (not cotton!) made of material that retains heat even when wet, to help you stay warm and dry.
- Wear bright colors or a high-visibility life jacket. The law requires a boat to carry one life jacket per person aboard, but people die each year because they weren't wearing their life jacket. Buckle and zip up that life jacket! Learn more about life jackets.
- Carry a first aid kit and know how to use it.
- Carry a cell phone or radio for emergency communication, but keep in mind you may not have service in a river valley or remote area.
- Carry plenty of food and water. Drink fluids frequently to avoid dehydration, which can impair your judgment and damage your health. If you get a headache or haven't urinated in a few hours, drink a quart of water.

On the water

- Don't paddle if you are under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- Use extra caution when paddling in cold water. Boating accidents are five times more likely to be fatal if the water is colder than 60 degrees.
- Never strap a person or lifejacket to a canoe or kayak.
- Paddling in a group is safer than paddling alone. If you are in a group, stay within visual or verbal contact if possible.
- In areas of high motorboat traffic, stay near the shore, and approach waves head-on or at a slight angle to avoid capsizing.
- If you do fall out or capsize, keep your feet pointed downstream and keep them off the bottom to avoid getting snagged or stuck. Stay upstream of your boat to avoid getting pinned between it and a rock or log.

Reading the water

- Scan ahead for hazards like overhanging trees, rocks, low bridges or rapids.
- If a section of river appears too challenging for your and your group, don't be afraid to portage around it. This is a much better option than paddling in rapids, or quick currents that you aren't used to. "When in doubt, get out and scout!"
- Riffles in the water mean that rocks are dangerously close to the surface. Follow the smooth water shaped like a "V" pointing downstream.

- · Narrow-leaved coneflower (Echinacea angustifolia)
- Rough blazing star (Liatris aspera)
- Meadow blazing star (Liatris ligulistylis)
- Black-eyed susan (Rudbeckia hirta)

FOR RUBY-THROATED HUMMINGBIRDS:

- Bergamot (Monarda fistulosa)
- Cardinal flower (Lobelia cardinalis)

NOTES:




aquatic invasive species laws

REMEMBER!



CLEAN all visible aquatic plants, zebra mussels, and other prohibited invasive species from watercraft, trailers, and water-related equipment before leaving any water access or shoreland.



drain

DRAIN water-related equipment (boat, ballast tanks, portable bait containers, motor) and drain bilge, livewell and baitwell by removing drain plugs before leaving a water access or shoreline property. Keep drain plugs out and water-draining devices open while transporting watercraft.

dispose

DISPOSE of unwanted bait, including minnows, leeches, and worms, in the trash. It is illegal to release bait into a waterbody or release aquatic animals from one waterbody to another. If you want to keep your bait, you must refill the bait container with bottled or tap water.

KNOW ТНЕ LAW

You may not...

- Transport watercraft without removing the drain plug.
- Arrive at lake access with drain plug in place.
- Transport aquatic plants, zebra mussels, or other prohibited species on any roadway.
- Launch a watercraft with prohibited species attached.
- Transport water from Minnesota lakes or rivers.
- Release bait into the water.

rinse

Spray, rinse, dry – Some invasive species are small and difficult to see at the access. To remove or kill them, take one or more of the following precautions before moving to another waterbody, especially after leaving zebra mussel and spiny waterflea infested waters:

- Spray with high-pressure water
- Rinse with very hot water*
- Dry for at least 5 days

Run motor and personal watercraft for a few seconds to discharge water before leaving a water access.

Transport fish on ice – be prepared, bring a cooler.

* These water temperatures will kill zebra mussels and some other AIS: 120°F for at least 2 minutes; or 140°F for at least 10 seconds.

If you suspect a new infestation of an invasive plant or animal, take a photo and note the location, or save a specimen and report it to a local DNR invasive species contact.


