

Round Lake News

The winter of 2018-19, Round Lake suffered significant fish winter-kill of all species. The only species seen that spring were the smaller northern, most likely all male (according to the DNR) and a few young largemouth bass. This historic event (an almost total fish die-off/winter kill) started the process of restocking our lake with game fish as we are not part of the Otter Tail river chain of Blanche, Deer, Long, Pelican Bay, Otter Tail, and Walker that shares fish stocked by the DNR. We are in our 4th year of the stocking process. The lake is doing well. Many anglers and 'fish watchers' have reported all species thriving. We also have a shared newsletter with emails and contacts of property owners if help is needed for future conservation efforts.

Thank you to the association, donors, and advocates that helped with this initiative.

Swimming Lessons Taught by YMCA Instructors

Swimming lessons are provided by OTLPOA foundation and Association and are taught by staff from Fergus Falls Area YMCA instructors. Kids or adults successfully completing a class are reimbursed for cost of lessons. The goal of the OTLPOA foundation and association is to prevent any tragic incidents on our lakes.

Swimming lessons will meet five times for 45 minutes each time. (Preschool lessons are 30 minutes each.) Instructors will not have much time between lessons, so swimmers are asked to be ready to begin their lesson immediately at their start time. Parents are encouraged to stay and watch lessons. If parents leave the swimming area during lessons, they are asked to be back promptly at the end of the lesson. Instructors will not be able to supervise swimmers in the water who are not in a lesson. Swimming lessons meet regardless of weather. If it is unsafe to swim due to weather, safety skills will be taught in the shelter located near each beach.

LOCATIONS

Ottertail Lake at Amor Park Beach and West Battle Lake across from Lions Park in Battle Lake. Advance registrations only. No registrations at the beach. *Spots held only upon payment*

Preschool (approximate ages 2 1/2 to 5 years): Learn water adjustment skills, front and back float. Learn to move in the water on front and back. Learn to be comfortable in the water. Lessons meet Monday through Friday, five lessons of 30 minutes each. Limited enrollment; register early.

Level 1 Introduction to Water Skills (approximate ages 5-7): This level is ideal for the child who has not had previous swim instruction or is unable or uncomfortable with putting their entire face in the water. The purpose of this level is for students to become more comfortable in the water. Students will become proficient in skills such as entering and exiting the water safely, submerging entire face, using a life jacket, and beginning front and back float.

Level 2 Fundamental Aquatic Skills (approximate ages 7 & 8): This level is ideal for the child who is able to put their face in the water but is unable to independently float on their front and back. The purpose of this level is for students to begin to develop fundamental water skills. In this level,students will learn to swim unaided 15 feet on either their front or back as well as entering the water by jumping or stepping from the side, treading water, roll over from back to front and front to back.

Level 3 Stroke Development (approximate ages 8 & 9): In this level, students will continue to build on the fundamentals learned in the previous levels. The skills mastered in this level include rotary breathing, front and back crawl, butterfly kick and body motion, standing or kneeling dive, survival float, tread water for 30 seconds, as well as emergency situation Check Call Care.

Level 4 Stroke Improvement (approximate ages 9 & 10): In this level, students develop confidence in the skills learned in previous levels as well as improve other aquatic skills. The skills mastered in this level include swimming 25 yards of front and back crawl as well as 15 yards of butterfly,breaststroke, and elementary backstroke. In addition to these skills, water safety will also be implemented through the learning of a throwing assist, safe diving rules, and how to care for a choking victim.

Level 5 Stroke Refinement (approximate ages 9-12): In this level, students will further coordinate and refine skills they have learned in past levels. Students will master the following skills: front and back crawl, sidestroke, breaststroke, front flip turn, and elementary backstroke.

Level 6 Swimming and Skill Proficiency (approximate ages 11-13): In this level, students will focus on endurance and stroke technique. The purpose of this level is for students to refine strokes and be able to swim with ease, efficiency, power and effectiveness over great distances. Some skills for lifeguarding and fitness will be taught.



DNR Offers Advice for Dealing With Storm Damaged Trees

Cleanup following a storm can be an overwhelming task for homeowners. If trees have been damaged, knowing which to save and which to remove can enhance people's safety and the survival of remaining trees, according to the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources.

WHEN ADDRESSING STORM-DAMAGED TREES:

DO:

- Use caution when approaching damaged trees. If there are downed wires, stay clear and call 911.
- Carefully inspect standing trees for damage and address hazardous trees first. Hazardous trees have detached or loosely hanging branches and split or cracked trunks that can cause injury or damage to property.
 - Remove trees if more than 50% of the trunk or live branches in the crown are damaged, the tree is unnaturally leaning or roots are damaged, or the tree could injury people or damage property. If you're unsure if a tree should be removed or can be saved, consult with a certified arborist.
 - Assess the size of the tree and pruning job and play it safe. Consult a certified arborist on medium and large branches, or whole tree removal.
- Use proper pruning techniques to remove small, broken limbs by cutting just outside the branch collar, but limit pruning to the minimum amount necessary to address safety risks. Too much pruning can weaken an already stressed tree – and many trees are stressed due to last year's drought.
- Make sure damaged trees get rain or are watered weekly to help them repair and rebuild. Be careful not to overwater, especially in heavy clay soils – the equivalent of 1 inch per week is ideal.
 - Monitor damaged trees in upcoming years to make sure they don't decay or become a hazard.

DON'T:

- Be rushed by promises of bargains from inexperienced or unqualified tree service providers. Ask for references and proof of insurance.
- Repair a broken branch or fork of a tree with tape, wire, bolts or other wraps. The wound will not heal, and the split will invite decay and further weaken the tree. Cabling or bracing should only be performed by a certified arborist and inspected annually.
- Remove the tops of trees. This makes the tree more susceptible to insects and disease, and promotes the growth of new branches that are weakly attached.
- Apply paint or dressing to wounds, as these materials interfere with a tree's natural wound sealing process.
- Remove small, leaning trees. Trees less than 15 feet tall may survive if they are gently pulled back into place. Press out air spaces in the loosened soil. The tree can then be staked for up to a year.
- Fertilize stressed or damaged trees. Fertilizer can trigger rapid but weak growth and deplete the tree's energy reserves that are needed to recover from damage.

Information on tree care, proper pruning techniques and handling damaged trees is available on the storm damage page of the DNR website. For more extensive information on tree care, contact a DNR forester, city forester, certified arborist or county extension staff.

Decontamination Unit Added to Otter Tail Lake Sportsman Public Water Access

Otter Tail County will place a decontamination unit at the Otter Tail Lake Sportsman Public Water Access 1.5 miles south of downtown Ottertail City off of Minnesota State Highway 78. The site will be staffed starting June 10th Friday through Sunday between the hours of 7 AM and 5 PM.

Additionally, boaters can have courtesy decontaminations done at dozens of locations around the state. The decontamination units and DNR-authorized watercraft inspectors can help you comply with invasive species laws and reduce the risk of spreading aquatic invasive species.

TRAIL NOTES: The park has 11 miles of hiking trail, 5.2 miles of surfaced bike trail and 3.2 miles of mountain bike trails. In winter, park maintains 8 miles of groomed, easy to intermediate level cross-country ski trails, Snowshoeing is allowed alongside but not on groomed ski trails.

SEASON RENTALS: Bicycle, rowboat, canoe, kayak, paddleboat, and stand up paddleboard rental is open until October 25, 2021. Winter rentals (crosscountry skis and snowshoes) are not available. Nestled in the transition zone between prairie and hardwood forest, Glendalough offers a true respite from civilization. Crystal clear Annie Battle Lake is a 335-acre, non-motorized "Heritage Fishery" that provides a tranquil fishing experience second to none. Special regulations sustain a steady supply of large sunfish, crappie, and the occasional walleye for the frying pan, and large bass for the camera. Near the pristine shores of this lake are a cart-in campground and canoe-in campsites, all free from the traffic and noise of traditional drive-in camping.

Annie can also be the starting point for an exploration of the park by canoe or kayak on the connecting creeks. The restored historic Glendalough lodge on the north side of the lake details the park's history as a private retreat and game farm for the Minneapolis Tribune.

A paved bike trail loop and numerous hiking trails, including two interpretive trails, meander along five lakes, through rich woods and blooming prairies. Wildlife abounds year-round, and there are many observation decks along the trails. Trails are groomed in winter for skiing and snowshoeing. Picnicking and swimming is available on two sandy lakes.

NATURALIST PROGRAMS & PARK TOURS: Park shares a naturalist with Lake Carlos State Park. Call park office for more information.

BUILDINGS & ATTRACTIONS: Molly outdoor Picnic Shelter, historic Lodge, and Dining Hall are now available to rent and can be reserved by calling the park.

Minnesota is known as the land of 10,000 lakes. While out enjoying our lakes remember that boating while intoxicated (BWI) is dangerous and could be costly. Boaters convicted of BWI face significant monetary fines, possible jail time, impoundment of their boat and trailer, and the loss of boat operating privileges.

WHAT IS THE LEGAL LIMIT WHEN BOATING WHILE INTOXICATED?

The alcohol concentration for impaired operation is .08. Operating a motorboat while under the influence of alcohol, a controlled substance (or its metabolite), or other illegal chemical is unlawful.

WHAT IS THE PENALTY?

Operators who are impaired may be required to take tests by an enforcement officer. There is a penalty for refusal. BWI convictions and refusals are recorded on the violator's driver's license record. Most of the BWI law is now found in the motor vehicle statutes, and first time violators (no prior DWIs of any kind) who are convicted are subject to:

- up to a \$1,000 fine plus surcharges
- possible jail time
- loss of motorboat operating privileges for 90 days during the boating season, after conviction and written notification by the DNR

In addition, persons who refuse testing will also be subject to a separate and more severe criminal charge for refusal and loss of their motorboat operating privileges for one year, immediately upon refusal.

ELEVATED OFFENSES

If any of the following aggravating factors are involved, the offense automatically becomes a gross misdemeanor (a 4th conviction in 10 years can result in a felony penalty):

- an alcohol concentration of .20 or more
- prior DWI conviction(s) or refusal(s) of any kind in the past 10 years
- there is a child less than 16 years of age on board

Penalties will increase with any of the aggravating factors or a refusal, and can include the following:

- a higher fine
- mandatory jail time
- loss of motor vehicle drivers license
- loss of motor vehicle plates
- forfeiture of the motorboat and trailer being operated at the time of arrest

BE RESPONSIBLE

The BWI law does not prohibit drinking alcoholic beverages aboard boats nor having an open bottle. The law applies to operators of motorboats that are not anchored, beached, moored, docked or being rowed or propelled by non-mechanical means at the time of the offense.

Alcohol impairs judgment and reaction time on the water just as is does when driving a car, even more so because of the sun, heat, wind, noise and the vibrations of the boat. If you boat under the influence of drugs or alcohol you are endangering your life and the lives of others. No one should ever be injured or killed because someone chose to drink and boat.

Boat Safety Tips Minnesota Department of Natural Resources | mndnr.gov

DNR officials say all boaters have a difficult, but also present safety role to play in keeping Minnesota's lakes and rivers safe.

"We've seen almost-unprecedented pressure on our state's waterways the past few years, and there's no reason to think anything will be different this year," said Lt. Adam Block, Enforcement Division boating law administrator. "It's great to see people enjoying the best of our natural resources but before they do, we ask them to take a few moments to ensure every boat ride is a safe boat ride."

With boaters of all experience and skill levels sharing Minnesota's waterways, it's up to every boater to do their part to ensure everyone makes it home at the end of the day. These safety tips can help make the start of the summer boating season fun, memorable and safe:

WEAR A LIFE JACKET, DON'T JUST BRING IT. Ninety percent of boating fatality victims in the state weren't wearing a life jacket. While the law requires children under 10 to wear a life jacket while the boat is underway, wearing a life jacket is the best way boaters of all ages can help ensure they get home safely.

LEAVE THE ALCOHOL ON SHORE.

Not only is boating under the influence illegal, it's also the single greatest factor in fatal boating accidents.

CHECK SAFETY EQUIPMENT. Make sure life jackets fit and are in good condition, and check to ensure your boat's navigation lights, soundproducing devices, fire extinguishers and carbon monoxide detectors are in good condition. Also, inspect the engine cut-off lanyard and make sure to wear it when the boat is underway.

PAY ATTENTION ТО HIGH **WATER.** Water levels in waterways throughout the state are high this year. High water can make access risks by hiding hazards beneath the water's surface.

OWN YOUR WAKE. Large wakes can have environmental consequences (causing shoreline erosion, for example) and present dangers to other boaters, paddlers and swimmers.

BRUSH UP ON THE RULES. Read the 2022 Minnesota Boating Guide(mndnr.gov/Regulations/ BoatWater) and take an online course(mndnr.gov/ education Safety/BoatWater/Education.html) to help increase your knowledge. More information, including boater education requirements and information on safe boating, is on the boat and water safety page of the DNR website (gov/Safety/ BoatWater)



Whether you're in a state forest or in your backyard, campfires should be constructed and maintained with safety in mind. Use a designated fire ring or build a campfire in an area cleared of combustible materials 5 feet in all directions around the fire. Campfires must be 3 feet or less in diameter and not more than 3 feet in height.

BUILDING AND PUTTING OUT A CAMPFIRE

- Think before you strike. Check the burning restrictions for your area before lighting a campfire.
- Select a level spot a safe distance away from trees, low overhead branches, shrubs, dry grass, or logs to prevent the fire from escaping, and clear all combustibles within 5 feet.
- Have a shovel and water available at the campfire site for extinguishing campfires.
- Supervise the fire at all times. Even a light breeze could cause the fire to spread.
- Extinguish the campfire with water using the "drown and stir" method.
